PLACEMENT EXAMS AND INTERVIEWS

Placement exams help determine which courses are appropriate for your experience level, and successful completion of a placement exam enables you to skip the introductory course in some departments. You will not receive credit for courses you place out of, so there's no reason to take a placement exam unless you intend to continue on in the relevant subject(s).

Placement exams and interviews are scheduled for the afternoon of Tuesday, August 27, 2013. There are two back-to-back sessions, which allows you to take up to two exams. Session 1 is from 2-3:30 p.m. and Session 2 is from 3:30-5 p.m. Several of these exams take the full 90 minutes to finish; it is important that you be on time. Please note that some exams are only offered during one session.

Economics: The economics exam is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. only. It is intended for those students who have successfully completed college level work in economics and wish to determine whether their previous coursework prepared them for courses beyond the intro level. It should be noted that Reed's introductory economics course includes coverage up to what might be considered an intermediate level at many other undergraduate institutions. So completion of introductory economics at another school will not necessarily prepare you to place out of our intro course.

The purpose of the exam is to identify those students who need NOT take Music 111 but who may instead enroll in Music 112 (offered in the spring semester), for which it is normally a prerequisite. Please note that this is not an exam to qualify you to *take* Music 111; the course is open to everyone regardless of background. If, however, you feel you have sufficient experience in music and its notation to go into a more advanced course, you should take the placement exam. Material covered includes intervals, triads & seventh chords, key signatures, providing chords from Roman numerals, figured bass, and notation of a known melody.

Physics: The physics examination is scheduled for 2:00 p.m. only. The test is intended for those incoming students who have successfully completed college level work in physics, plan to major in physics, and wish to place out of the first semester of introductory physics. Students who perform well on the placement exam will be permitted to skip Physics 101 and start the physics major with Physics 102 in the spring semester.
